

Parish Nurse Basic Preparation Continues!!!!

The basic preparation curriculum for faith-based nurses (see below for proposed changes to the title parish nurse), began in the modular format in June 2004. The modular format provides a series of seven (7), non-sequential seminars covering the curriculum, necessary for parish nursing, outlined by the International Parish Nurse Resource Center (IPNRC). The offerings are possible through a partnership with Florida Atlantic University's Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing. Participants receive five (5) contact hours per session and once all seven (7) modules are completed, a certificate in parish nursing is issued. The modules run continuously so that nurses can eventually collect all and receive their certificate in parish nursing.

Three modules have been offered and by October 2005, the entire first series will be completed. Interest in the curriculum has been positive. Module 3: ***Faith-based Nursing Practice Considerations: Legal/Ethical and Interfaith Prayer Interventions*** was attended by 18 nurses. Marnie Poncy, a nurse and an attorney with the Bioethics Project of the Legal Aid Society of Palm Beach County, engaged the group in a lively and highly energetic session about legal issues that affect nursing practice in a congregation. The pace of learning continued in the afternoon as an inter-

faith clergy panel shared their individual faith traditions within the context of prayers for healing. Imagine the opportunity to interact with clergy of various religions: ***Judaism***—Rabbi Steve Westman of Temple Beth El in West Palm Beach

Islam—Gholam Rahman a member of the Muslim community and journalist

Buddhism—Reverend Maya Malay the Ngakmos at the Dharma Center, Lake Worth, Florida

Catholicism—Father Seamus Murtaugh of St. Ann Catholic Church and parish in West Palm Beach

Reformed Protestantism—Reverend Mary Wright of the First Presbyterian Church of West Palm Beach

Baha'i—Ted Brownstein a member of the Baha'i faith and author of The Interfaith Prayer Book (see page 3: Resource Corner—Internet websites)

Interfaith Collective—Taylor Stevens spiritual leader and founder

At the conclusion, clergy led the group in an interfaith prayer experience. Participants left the session feeling connected to a common "God" and one another. Everyone agreed that the experience was enlightening, interesting and an amazing opportunity.

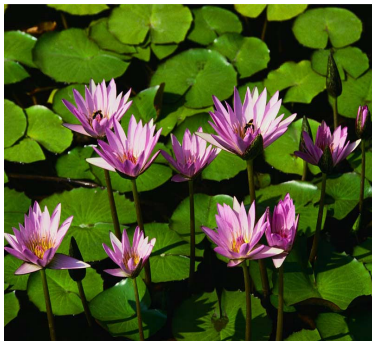

In August 2004, a draft of the revisions was placed on the Health Ministries website and nurses were asked to provide feedback. After considering the comments, a final draft of the document was sent to the review board at ANA and a final decision is pending. The major changes in the *Scope and Standards*.... Include:

1. New formatting to reflect the 2004 revised *Scope and Standards of Nursing Practice*
2. A **change in the name** of parish nurse to **faith community nurse** or FCN. This is an attempt to be inclusive of all religious traditions
3. Inclusion of practice standards for:
 - * outcome measurement
 - * research data collection
 - * advanced practice nurses
4. Specific measurement criteria for each standard of practice.

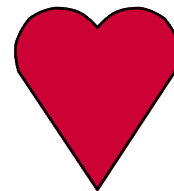
